

2018 Year in Review

Andy Bratton - Senior Minister

God never ceases to amaze me as He continues to work mightily in the body of the church here at KCC. Every year I challenge everyone to read through the Bible in a year and in 2018 we had 50 people (that I know of) that read all the way through the Bible. And several of them for the first time. I can't emphasize enough that as we draw close to Jesus, we will be more effective if we at least understand the story of God, which comes from **SEEKING SCRIPTURE**. To be like Jesus is to know His Word.

Over 90 women signed up to be in Titus 2 last fall! Of our regularly attending adult women, that has to be 80-90% of our ladies. We have about 50% of our adults in Life Groups and I had 12 guys go through Mission Impossible in 2018. Beyond that I know of several men that get together regularly to disciple one another to be like Jesus. At KCC this is how we **SHARPEN AND BE SHARPENED**. Jesus had his group of 12 men as well as his inner circle of three men that He disciplined. We want to continue to follow that pattern in order to be like Jesus.

In November I challenged everyone to be like the first church (Acts 2:45) and sell something in order to give the proceeds to those in need. I chose Haiti as Jeff and Carol Badgero serve some of the poorest of the poor there. You donated just short of \$3,000! We have a team of people that serve, set up, and clean up for funeral dinners. Many of the funeral dinners we serve are not direct connections to our church. It is a ministry we provide to our community. We built wheelchair ramps, thanks to the efforts of about 10 different people in our body. These actions and more are **SHOWING COMPASSION**. Jesus entered a town, and while He had teaching to do and discipling to do, the Bible tells us that He saw the people and had compassion on them. We, too, want to show compassion to a hurting world.

We held a volunteer appreciation banquet this year and about 125 people were able to attend. Every Sunday close to 50 volunteers are needed to fill all of the PART's we have available and you step up and fill those roles. When you do you are **SERVING SACRIFICIALLY**. Jesus served sacrificially by going to the cross on our behalf. He displayed what it means to serve by washing His disciples' feet.

At KCC we want to be **CHRIST INSPIRED**. We want to be a church that reflects Jesus and helps people to reflect Him. We narrowed it down to the four areas listed above. Which area is going to be your area of focus for 2019? Which one will you challenge yourself to grow in? As we all grow to be Christ Inspired, doing everything to honor Him and glorify Him, the impact on His Kingdom will be great and His blessing on our church will be great as well. I can't wait to see where God takes us in 2019.

Annual Report 2018 to the Congregation

God is doing amazing things through the church that meets at 1725 W. Kalkaska Road in Kalkaska, Michigan! I love to see cars in the parking lot every day all hours of the day! The church is very active in the community of Kalkaska and it shows. Members and non-members alike are part of the church life through funerals, weddings, community groups, banquets, Bible studies, worship, and much more. The community of Kalkaska will “know we are Christians by our love.”

This past year we saw 27 people, both young and old, give their lives to Jesus Christ through baptism and 4 additional people transfer their membership to KCC. We are working as a staff and Eldership to better follow-up with new members and hope to see a solid plan for doing so in 2019.

I led several Faith Training classes in 2018 in the Faith Cafe with over 30 different people attending at one time or another. Two studies were from Judah Smith. They were based on his books, Jesus is ____ and Life is _____. Both gave us great discussion and material about living the Christian life today. The most recent study was called Radical by David Platt. Radical challenged all of us to take a much deeper look at our abundance and God’s calling upon each of our lives.

We were very close to live streaming our Sunday morning messages when the computer built to run the whole program died. I had hoped to launch live streaming in December but had to replace the motherboard, graphics card, hard drive, and power supply. I guess what Solomon wrote is true, “There is a time for everything,” and obviously this wasn’t yet the time! In the meantime, I’m working on obtaining a PTZ (pan, tilt, zoom) camera to capture center video using a remote control console. Look for live streaming in 2019.

My family hosted a Life Group in 2018 using material from KCC’s Sunday messages. I say, “my family” because it really does take a team to ready the house, set the kitchen, prepare the drinks and food, and care for the children. We have a wonderful, healthy Life Group. I am so thankful for my wife, Anita, who does the majority of the preparation for our group along with my children, Scott and Kaylin, who step up every week and do whatever needs to be done.

It is an honor to chair the KCC Missions Committee, made up by 7 KCC members. The church supports missions locally, nationally, and internationally. For 2019 we are attempting to use 15% of the overall church budget and simply give it away to missions. For a more detailed report, please see the Missions report.

I look forward to serving at KCC in 2019. In late 2018 staff and elders along with some other KCC members met with The Unstuck Group with the purpose of exploring ways to grow as a church. It will be an exciting year as we see these plans unfold.

2018 Childrens' Ministry Year in Review

Faith Training - For Faith Training hour we used HeartShaper again. The reason I love HeartShaper is that it stays true to the Bible, builds on age-appropriate spiritual development principles, and integrates Bible skills into each lesson, building on each other from one age level to the next. It helps kids learn to explore God's word and teaches them to dig into questions like, "why is this story important to me?" It helps kids to discover how scripture applies to their lives.

Kidmo - Every Sunday at 11:00 We have a children's (K-5) service downstairs. We are using the Johnny Rogers Kidmo curriculum. It's a combination of fast paced videos that follow a theme and Bible lesson every week. Every week the kids compete to answer questions during our Kwizmo time. They also learn a bible verse with actions during our memory max time. Following the video we break into small groups and have discussions and look up verses to help the kids really understand the lesson. They also have a map book to take home for the week, filled with fun activities and challenges pertaining to the lesson. This year we started having different hosts come in for a 5 week block and lead the program. The kids have LOVED getting to know other members of our congregation!

WASP - Wed nights right after school we will have WASP for all kids Kindergarten through 3rd grade. We are using a Pirate themed VBS for our curriculum. The kids love doing science experiments, going to Bible story theater, crafts, and games. This group has grown to over 40 kids. I love seeing them run off of the bus every Wednesday eager to learn more about God and his plan for them.

Octane - Octane is our 4th and 5th grade youth group that meets on Thursday nights. We will discover life lessons from the Bible and apply them to our lives and what 4th and 5th graders are going through. We will be meeting in the lower level after school on Thursdays, but will leave the building on occasion for service projects, hands on lessons, and fun. This is such an important time for tweens to surround themselves with positive peer pressure, and to know that they can count on God and each other as they go through this, and every phase of life. In 2018, the kids have visited assisted living, participated in an "Amazing Race" to collect items for Thanksgiving baskets to give away, made paintings for their families, and learned a lot! I am excited for their upcoming trip to the Christ in Youth conference in March.



I am so very thankful to our church leaders, and church members for their support of the Children's Programs, and ministry at KCC. The KCC KIDZ are our future and our future looks very bright!

The Kalkaska Church of Christ Library was blessed with a very productive 2018. Thank you for your donations, requests and input.

Mary Kay Verstrat is our newest volunteer. She is replacing Debbie Davis, who unfortunately moved to 'snowy' Oklahoma. Le' Baxter, Mary Kay and I work in the library on Wednesday afternoons. We will be there at least one other day a week this coming year.

Materials that are fifteen years old, and older, are being removed, making space for new. Please keep this in mind if you are planning on donating to our library. The exceptions to the fifteen year guideline include: non-fiction, reference, and series. We have several old FREE Christmas, Gospel, Country and Rock CD's.

Duplicates are being given to our 'sister' church in Rapid City. If you have a different preference, please let us know when you make the donation. A "Donated By" label will be affixed to the material, if we know who makes the donation.

Overdue lists are located in both libraries, please check to see if you have a CD in your car, a book under your bed or if the naughty Christmas Elf is hiding a KCC DVD on your shelf. Monitoring overdue material takes time and money, please be conscious of the library items you have. "Checking out is what the library is about," I love how much the library is being used and know Jeanne Lantzer is smiling in Heaven.

Speaking of Jeanne, I finally decided on the perfect use of her memorial money, a new software program. I deliberated on this for a long time, because it is rather high tech and a huge leap of faith. Thank you to our board members which have approved an increase in the library budget, coupled with the memorial money, this upgrade is now possible. In 2019 our library will be using a company called Book Systems. This company uses Atrium , a 100% web-based system, and is accessible from any computer or mobil device with an internet connection. It allows users to search the library, as well as renew and reserve material.

Changing over to the new system, in both libraries, is going to take a lot of time and work. My goal is to have this transition done by early March. The new system also requires new labels, at seven cents each, for scanning. The cost of relabeling is the primary reason for eliminating older materials.

I will try to keep you informed on the progress of our new system. Please feel free to contact me anytime regarding the new system and other library concerns.

Men's Ministry

At KCC the goal of our Men and Boys Ministry is to stir the hearts of men to grow closer to God and walk more closely with our brothers and sons. We have two slogans, "**Every boy needs an uncle**" and "**Bring a friend**". In 2018 we sponsored the following events:

1. Four "Fifth Sunday Preacher's Prayer Partner's Breakfasts". These meetings feature a hot buffet breakfast, round table fellowship, an inspiring devotional and round table prayer. The Preacher's Prayer Partner's Breakfasts are quarterly when there is a fifth Sunday in a month. We gather at 7:15. In 2018, we averaged 35 men per meeting and have a list of over 50 men committed to praying for Andy and our staff one day a week. Look for these meetings in 2019 at the end of April, July, September and December.
2. A Higher Call Conference "Full Draw" at Gaylord E. Free Church was attended by 10 men in mid-March. This Spiritual pep-talk encourages men and boys to know their God and do His work. This was approximately our tenth year attending this meeting with 10 to 15 men. The theme for the 2019 Conference is "Base Camp" and will be held on Saturday March 9. The featured speakers are Stu Weber, a Vietnam Green Burette and author of "Tender Warrior" and Tom Joyce, "Top Gun" movie pilot and Navy Captain. Tickets, including lunch, are \$35 until February 16.
3. The 14th Annual Men and Boys Pancake Breakfast and Clay Pigeon Shoot was cancelled this year after two scheduled dates. The worst of winter came in April and lasted most of the month. In 2019, with "Spring Break" being the last week of March, we "target" Saturday, April 6 for this event. Breakfast will be in the Fellowship hall at KCC and the Shoot will be at Wilderness Christian Assembly. We are always looking for extra hands to help with this event.
4. The 14th Annual River Float and Bond fire cookout was held on Saturday September 8. This year we changed rivers and floated a portion of the "Mason Tract" on the S. Branch of the Au Sable. This event is a relaxing afternoon observing God's beautiful creation in a regatta of brightly colored canoes and kayaks floating down a "flies only" stretch of the S. Branch of the Au Sable River. The day concludes with an inspirational devotional and bonfire dinner (and sometimes chocolate chip cookies). This year we had about 24 floaters and a 4 member ground crew. We hold this event the Sunday after Labor Day each year. In 2019 the expected date will be Saturday September 7. We are always looking for extra hands to help with this event as well.

Attending Winsome Women was a new event. Twenty-eight women were part of the two-day retreat at the Grand Hotel on Mackinaw Island. Speakers discussing the theme, "The Great I Am", included Nancy DeMoss (one of the authors of the Titus 2 Bible studies), Sarah Scieber, Ben Manthei and musician Sandi Patty. It is our intention to continue offering this opportunity rotating through the May and October event (2019 - we are looking at the October retreat--more info to come).

Lisa Bratton, once again, pulled off a wonderful year of Titus 2. About 80 women participated in the monthly meetings held between September and May. September 2018 started another year with 95 women participating. This ministry is designed to mentor women in their walk with Jesus. The current study, "IF: Enjoying Jesus", is focused on the spiritual disciplines of following Jesus such as praying, meditating, and fasting. Many women are being challenged in their relationships with Christ.



In the winter months of 2018, we decided to beat cabin fever with a couple of Bunco nights. We fellowshiped, played, won prizes, and snacked. While numbers were not huge for these events, the women who attended were thrilled and asked for more—coming soon!

Kalkaska Baby Pantry

The Kalkaska Baby Pantry has been steadily growing over the past four and a half years. We are open 2 days a month, the second and fourth Tuesday's from 9:30 am until 1:00 pm. We provide diapers, wipes, wash, lotion, baby food as it's donated, and clothing from size newborn to 4T.

2014 was the first year that the Panty was open at the Church location. We have grown in many ways in just a few short years. 2017 was another record year – Here are some numbers of just a few items that the Pantry has provided in 2017:

636 Packages of Wipes
252 Bottles of Baby Wash/Lotion
We served OVER 700 Families!!!

The Kalkaska Baby Pantry Board has been working hard to improve the Pantry. We attend the Food Coalition meetings in Traverse City once a month to qualify for Grant monies that are given out each year and work with the other Baby Pantries in our 5-county area. This year, participating with other Baby Pantries in the area and Carter's children's clothing store, we were able to pass out a new pair of warm winter pajamas to every child in the pantry. Also, thanks to the Friends of the Kalkaska County Library, each child also received a new book at the December Baby Pantry. February is Child Dental Month, and we have new toothbrushes and toothpaste standing by to be passed out at the February Baby Pantry. In October we provided new socks and underwear to all children who were in need.

We plan to grow, nurture, and love the smallest and most precious members of our community. We would not be able to do all that we have done without the amazing support of the Kalkaska Church of Christ.

We would like to thank the Elders and the Church for your continued support of the Baby Pantry, so we can continue to aid the families in our community.

Missions Annual Report

The KCC Missions Committee meets once a month on the second Monday of each month at 5:00 pm in the Green Room. Ahtapa Sinlee of Asian Gospel Outreach in Thailand


