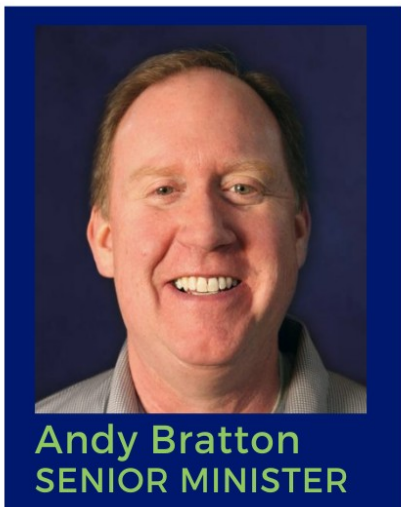

2026 LOOKING AHEAD

We began 2025 rolling out our three-year strategic plan called the "One Plan." The highlight of that plan was that we are challenging our church family to Reach One, Teach One, and Lead One. Meaning we are asking everyone to share their faith with at least one person over the course of the year, partner in discipleship, and mentor or pray for one of our youth.

As part of the plan, we launched our Plus One program for new believers, have integrated youth into our Sunday morning worship times more often, and focused our sermon series on how to interact with others to disciple them for Christ.

Some challenges still before us are space for our youth, specific evangelism training, and small group discipleship. All of those areas will be addressed in 2026.

From the "pulpit," we taught from Nehemiah, 1 and 2 Timothy, and the book of John. Topically, we addressed how we interact with each other, money and finances, and my favorite, what the Bible says about baptism. And, wow, did people ever respond. At last count, we baptized 56 people in 2025! I was blessed to hear some amazing stories of how God worked in people's lives to draw them to Him.

As for 2026, I am looking forward to presenting what God has laid on my heart to share with you. As of right now, it will include a study of God's love, the book of Hebrews, people who had specific conversations with Jesus, the life of a prophet, war stories in the Bible, and a study this summer called "A Soggy Gospel," where we look at how the Gospel played out close to or in the water.

Thank you for being an awesome church family. I can't wait to see what God does next.

ROOTED & REACHING

The Kalkaska Church of Christ is healthy and alive! I'm honored to be a part of it. I see the spiritual health of the church by the number of people involved in our discipleship programs, such as Basecamp for men, Titus 2 for women, KCC Wired for middle & high school youth, weekly children's programs for elementary age children, and Anchored Bible Study for both men and women. These programs are consistently reaching and teaching Christian men, women, and young people the Bible and how to live it.

The church is alive because we have witnessed spiritual births with over 50 baptisms this past year! Other ways to know it is alive are through seeing mature Christians continue to read through their Bibles all year long, thrive in small Life Groups, and worship on Sundays both in-person and online.

My aim on the church staff is to consistently support all of our current ministry endeavors, of which there are well over 50, through technology, volunteerism, and service. Just one aspect of using technology in ministry is our Sunday morning live-stream. Since early 2020 we have been sharing our Sunday morning worship services on Facebook, YouTube, and Church Online Platform (CHOP). This past year (2025) we've estimated an average of eighty to ninety individual viewers each week. Some are shut-ins or ill at home and can still stay connected to the church in this manner. Others have moved out of the area, but still enjoy seeing familiar faces and worshipping with us. Still others watch out of curiosity. We had one couple watch for an entire year before attending a service in-person. It's a privilege to share worship and the Gospel message in this way.

Ministry at KCC takes teamwork. We ask that everyone take a PART in it no matter how large or small. Use your gifts for God's Kingdom and help us reach more people with the love and grace of Jesus Christ. During 2025, there were well over 34 new volunteers looking to play a PART with the church. We saw new volunteers in areas such as our children's department, first impressions, and technology. Since the church is like a living body, there are always new PARTS to be filled as people come and go. If you found your PART with us, thank you! If you haven't yet, visit our website to get started.

Personally, my wife, Anita, and I celebrated 25 years of marriage this past September. Our oldest child, Scott, graduated from Michigan Tech University with a biomedical engineering degree. KCC WIRED YOUTH

It truly felt like there was something happening almost every single day this year: events, retreats, youth group nights, D-Groups, Fellowship of Christian Athlete huddles, weekly lunches at the Middle & High Schools, cheering our youth on at their extracurricular activities, and even spontaneous hangouts at our house or the houses of our other adult leaders. Ministry didn't stop at scheduled programs; it happened in everyday moments and relationships, which is where some of the most impactful

growth took place. Many of our youth faced personal battles in 2025 that quickly revealed areas of spiritual strength and weakness. Walking alongside them through those seasons and watching several come out the other side renewed, resilient, and more grounded in their walk with Christ, has been incredibly impactful to me. God has been at work in deep and meaningful ways.

One of the highlights of the year was our Middle School mission trip to serve the Native American community in Wisconsin. This experience stretched our students beyond their comfort zones and gave them a firsthand look at what it means to serve others selflessly. They learned, grew, and returned home with a greater awareness of God's heart for people and communities beyond their own. Leadership development continued to be a major focus as we had 20 student leaders actively pouring into their peers and into each other. These students stepped up in various ways while learning how to use their God-given gifts in ministry. It has been incredible to watch them grow in confidence, responsibility, and spiritual maturity as they learn what it means to lead like Christ. Our Wednesday night youth group attendance continued to grow this year, not only in numbers but in consistency. In past years, attendance often ebbed and flowed with sports seasons and community activities. Another exciting development was the Fall expansion of our weekly D-Groups to include Middle School students. These discipleship groups meet every Sunday night for an hour and a half to dig into God's Word and discuss it together. These smaller groups have become a place for honest conversation, accountability, and meaningful spiritual growth.



Our Fall and Winter Retreats were once again major highlights. The Fall Retreat at Statewide remains a favorite, and there is nothing quite like seeing our youth pour their hearts out for Jesus in a gymnasium filled with students from across Michigan. For the Winter Retreat, we returned to Starwood Ranch, where students loved hunkering down together under one roof. No matter where we go or what we do, these students love being together and they love growing in Christ. That is incredibly exciting to witness.

Above all, this year has been about growing our youth in Jesus. We've seen iron sharpening iron as students mentor one another, encourage one another, and challenge each other to go deeper in their faith. They are learning how to own their faith personally, not just borrow it from others, and they are discovering what it means to walk with Christ together. This included several instances in 2025 of our youth calling their Christian peers to walk the straight and narrow path. Watching our youth lovingly hold each other accountable, while showing grace to those who maybe weren't being so loving, was another highlight for me. Life and relationships are hard.

These youth are learning valuable skills and I know it will only help them later in life. We are deeply grateful for what God has done in and through KCC Wired Youth this year! I want to give a shoutout to our adult leaders below who tirelessly poured their time, knowledge, and heart into these youth. In the fall, we introduced 4 L.I.T's (Leaders In Training) to our leadership team. These are young adults who felt called to continue pouring into this ministry. It has been wonderful watching them walk alongside our other adult leaders and being a light to our youth. We've already seen a deeper level of accountability and connection with our youth because of this addition. God is continually growing and refining this ministry.

WHAT WE LEARNED:

Throughout WASP and Octane, kids memorized Scripture and learned about emotions—how to manage them, talk about them, and rely on God in those moments. We also walked through the life of Moses, exploring how God helped him through challenges and how He helps us today. Sunday mornings continued to focus on biblical foundations and stories that help kids understand who God is and how He works in their lives.

We also celebrated key events such as our Palm Sunday program, our upcoming Christmas program, and our community presence at Blazer Bash.

SERVING OTHERS:

Our Octane students modeled Christlike compassion in meaningful ways this year. They visited sick and elderly church members, offering encouragement, prayer, and handmade cards.

Their heart for service was also evident at VBS, where they helped lead the effort to raise \$1,348.25 for Hurricane Helene flood relief. The donation was sent to IDES to support families recovering from the disaster.

SPIRITUAL MILESTONES:

This year's Baptism Class had around 10 kids, helping them understand faith, repentance, and the decision to follow Jesus. A couple of students chose to be baptized, and many more seeds of faith were planted—seeds we often see bear fruit years later.

In April, 13 students and 8 adults traveled to Detroit for the SuperStart retreat, with plans to attend again in March 2026 in Columbus, Ohio.

A CARING, PRAYING COMMUNITY

More than any program or event, the biggest blessing this year has been the heart of our children. They faithfully pray for one another, bring prayer requests for their friends, and rejoice when God answers. Each week, we saw kids praying for a classmate whose dad was deployed overseas—and the whole group celebrated when he returned home safely.

Many parents shared videos and pictures of their children singing worship songs long after Sunday was over. And to me personally, the handmade cards, notes, and crafts the kids bring are so meaningful to me.

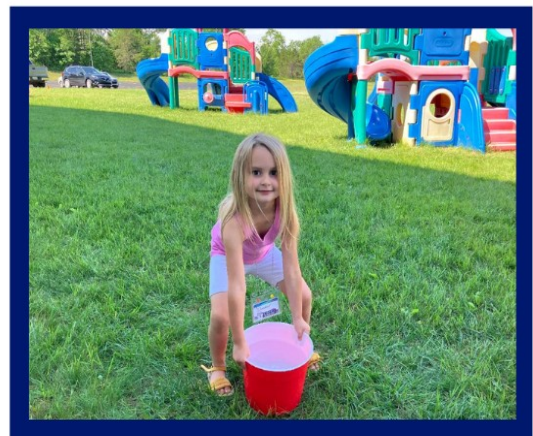

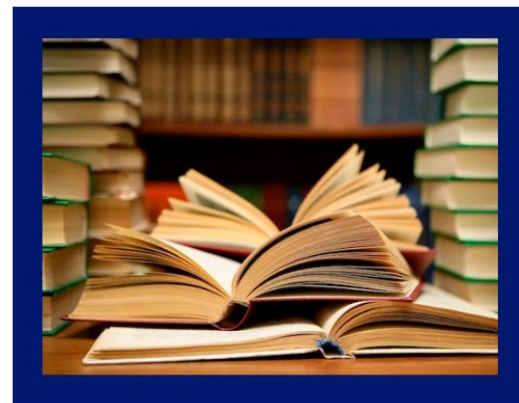

LIBRARY

This past year has been a truly wonderful one for the KCC Library. Cheri and I have been grateful for every opportunity to share new books with the congregation and to explore fresh ideas for keeping our collection vibrant and up to date. During the summer of 2025, we hosted the Garden of Readin' program for children in Pre-K through 5th grade. The Lord blessed us with a joyful group of young readers, and it was a delight to spend that time reading and learning together. We look forward to bringing even more engaging and meaningful experiences to the library in 2026.



In 2025, we added a total of 133 new books to our collection. These include a wide range of titles from new and local authors, as well as books on evangelism, mental health, devotionals, teen and young adult literature, children's books, and new large-print selections. MEN'S MINISTRY

The Men's Ministry hosted similar events in 2025 as in the past. The clay pigeon shoot brought just under 30 men and boys together in April. We continue to have first-time shooters, which is always fun, as they receive proper training from some skilled men who volunteer to teach.

Unfortunately, the river float had to be canceled in 2025. The temperature and overall weather were not conducive to getting out on the river. We had about 30 men and boys sign up for that event as well.

We are keeping our two-mile stretch of Highway 72 free of clutter since adopting the section of highway two years ago. We continue to have a handful of people show up to help us keep it clean. We could always use more hands. We have

three official cleaning times throughout the spring and summer. We will continue to let the church family know when those dates are upon us.

We were asked by the women's ministry to assist in the annual church picnic. We were able to help with corn hole and setup and tear-down of the event. We also hosted one of the KCC euchre nights in February. It was a small turnout, but fun, nonetheless.

The church was able to partner with Freedom Builders on nine different projects in 2025. Freedom Builders works in a five-county area and calls us when they have a project in Kalkaska County or Antrim County. We built wheelchair ramps, put roofs on, and repaired kitchens and bathrooms.

All of this activity becomes a conduit for more and more men to attend Basecamp. We averaged around 65 men at Basecamp in 2025, and it continues to grow! In the fall of 2025 we started a study on the book of James.

The final highlight is that we have added more men to the Men's Ministry leadership team. We are excited about the new ideas that may come about and the extra hands to help pull our events together.

The Pantry is open to serve the families in our community on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month from 9:30 am to 1:00 pm.

Families are welcome to come in and get essential needs for their children FREE OF CHARGE. We supply clothing, diapers, wipes, baby wash, baby lotion, outerwear, bibs, blankets, food, formula.

In addition, several times per year we have special items for the children and provide educational opportunities for our families. This year, we supplied: sunscreen, new socks, new underwear, blankets, books, toothbrushes, PJs, and winter outerwear.

At the end of 2024 the pantry decided to add additional support to our families by increasing the number of diapers that each child received per visit from 24 to 36. Little did we know that we would also have a 30% growth in families coming to the pantry. Our community continues to bless the pantry with donations and financial support.

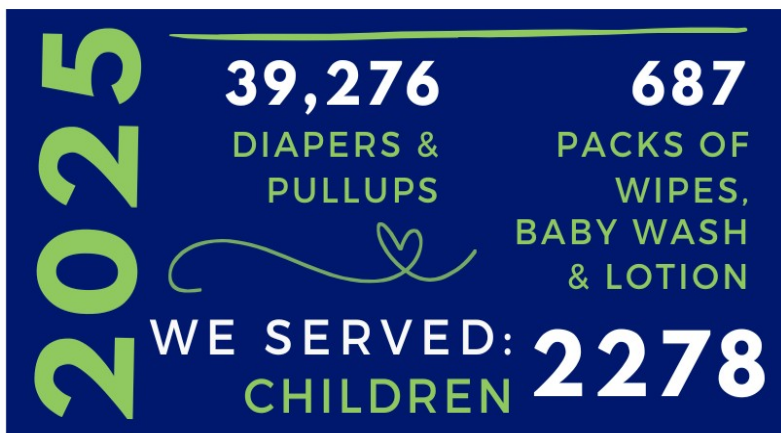

KCC currently **supports 15 missions and missionaries monthly**. These missions are local, national, and international. Also under the Missions umbrella are: Benevolence, Community Outreach, and Short Term/Miscellaneous Missions. The Benevolence category is managed by Steve Mathis and primarily responds to local needs within our church body. The Community Outreach category is managed by Andy Bratton and is used for outreach-type community events in Kalkaska County. The Short Term/Miscellaneous line item is managed by the mission committee and is used as random, unexpected mission-related expenses arise throughout the year.
